Clergy letter

Bishop Trevor, our bishop, has announced that he is retiring in May after nine years in the role.

Bishops remind us that we are part of something bigger, Christians don't just belong to a small local church, important though that is, we are linked to a much larger family and fellowship formed by all the churches of our diocese. The bishop is a visible sign and a practical link joining us together in that wider fellowship. Bishops also remind us that we are part of something ancient; we belong to all the Christians who went before us in previous centuries, and to those who will come after us in years to come.

Speaking of his and his wife Margaret's time in the Diocese, he said: "Everywhere we go, we're received with extraordinary generosity, hospitality and kindness. So when I do come to say goodbye to the Diocese, it will be with a heart overflowing with thanksgiving — and that's due to the people who are in this Diocese. In the time I've been in the Diocese, what gives me real joy and energy is the myriad ways — thousands and thousands of ways — that I've been privileged to share in the lives of others who have discovered that God loves them. '

The process of appointing a new diocesan bishop is complex and is handled by the Crown Nominations Commission which submits names to the Prime Minister for consideration. The new bishop is then appointed by the Queen on the advice of the Prime Minister. January was spent in consultations and drafting a statement of needs. On 9th February the Archbishop's Council meets to approve the final job description and the statement of needs. On 5th April the Crown Nominations Commission has its first meeting and then interviews are held on 7th and 8th May. That's the timetable as we know it at the moment.

Bishop Trevor's diocesan farewell will be on Saturday 11 May after Evensong in the Cathedral, which starts at 4pm. He will then conclude his public ministry by celebrating Holy Communion and preaching in the Cathedral on Sunday 12 May.

Please hold Bishop Trevor and Margaret in your prayers as they say farewell and prepare to leave this diocese and begin a new life in retirement. Pray also for all involved in discerning the needs of this diocese and choosing the new bishop.

Could a woman be our new bishop? Yes. Will it be me? NO!

All Saints' Church, Graveney Electoral Roll

What is the Electoral Roll?

The church's Electoral Roll is the register of its voting members; it is a list of those qualified to attend and to vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting. Electoral rolls provide an indication of the real membership and strength of the church.

Who can be on the Electoral Roll?

Baptised adults (over 16 years) who live in the parish, or who have worshipped regularly at All Saints for at least six months and are committed to being part of the life of the local Church of England congregation.

Why join?

Enrolment is a way of saying...." I belong".

For us it is an act of commitment to All Saints' Church, Graveney and the church as a whole. It opens the way for a greater involvement in the life of the church at parish, deanery, diocesan and national levels.

Every six years each church's electoral roll has to be started from scratch with **all members** having to sign up afresh. This is more than just a statistical clean-up. It gives regular worshippers an opportunity to commit themselves to the mission of the church and to the worship here at All Saints.

Parish Council News

The following is an edited summary of the Parish Council meeting held Monday 10th December at 7:30pm in the Village Hall.

Attended by 4 Councillors, Councillor Andrew Bowles (Borough and County Councillor), the Clerk and two members of the public.

Matters Arising:

Letters regarding fireworks are still to be sent.

Signatory forms for bank accounts are ready to be sent. New cheque books also received.

Individual responses by councillors to the Kent County Council ("KCC") budget consultation have been sent.

Cost of dog bin stations have been queried, but are unlikely to go down.

A questionnaire regarding local services was completed and now sent.

SSE have been contacted again around an overpayment. Lots of other customers have been affected, so it is taking them time to work through the back log. Clerk is monitoring the situation.

Local salt bins will be refilled. The low bridge sign is now in situ.

Crime Report:

The Neighbourhood Watch report and the Rural Crime Team report have been received. There is now a contact number for the Rural Crime Team and four dedicated officers in this area. There has been a burglary at a commercial property in Hernhill and other burglaries nearby recently.

Cleve Hill Solar Park:

A report from GREAT was read out. All residents were encouraged to register as interested parties individually, as the volume of representation could prove a deciding factor. It was agreed that the PC would register as an interested party and draft an initial submission based on bullet points from the previous response. It was also agreed to notify the planning consultant and check his future availability should his advice be required. The Clerk will register, draft submission and notify Lindsay Frost. The letter had gone to Swale Borough Council planning committee councillors and one response in support received, as well as one acknowledgement. An enquiry from Faversham Town Council as to the Parish Council's stance on the proposal had also been received and responded to.

Streetlighting:

The trial lantern has been fitted opposite the Four Horseshoes pub. It was agreed that it looks good and can be used for all future lantern replacements when necessary.

Finial signs at the school:

Although quotes for the finials have been received, there has been no response to requests for quotes for the larger sign.

Councillor Boggia has contacted more companies for further quotes.

Landscaping around village sign:

Detailed quotes are awaited.

KCC consultation on libraries, registration and archives:

It was agreed to respond in support of the mobile library service. Clerk to respond and send consultation link to councillors.

Kent Fire & Rescue Service consultation:

It was agreed that councillors would respond individually.

Swale Borough Council Corporate plan consultation:

It was agreed that councillors would respond individually.

Correspondence:

Contact numbers for the Kent Police Rural Team have been received.

Posters encouraging residents to stand in the elections next year have been requested.

Details of the Local Landscape Designations Review report have been received.

Finance:

The financial statement and bank reconciliation were reviewed and accepted. A number of small payments were approved.

Planning:

1 Quarry House, London Road, Boughton-under-Blean – proposed first floor extension with balcony. It was agreed not to comment.

Graveney & Goodnestone Trust:

The request to take the village children to the pantomime was approved.

Councillor Reports:

Councillor Lound: Reported that her bin has been emptied regularly for the last few weeks.

Councillor Boggia: Queried the state of Brenley roundabout. This is being chased by Councillor Andrew Bowles and Helen Whately MP. A pedestrian was injured in Hernhill. It was agreed to write to S & A Nursery asking them to remind their workers to walk responsibly.

Reports from Borough and County Councillors:

Councillor Andrew Bowles: Reported that KCC is managing to close the gap in the budget and the capital amount set for highways has gone up. An ongoing challenge is providing the necessary amount of housing in Swale.

Next Meeting:

The next meeting was held on Monday 14th January 2019 at 7.30pm.

A Message from your County Councillor

For those who didn't receive my November report may I wish you a Happy New Year.

I am now eagerly looking forward to my "You Decide" funding event to be held at Teynham Village Hall on Saturday 2nd February. The details are in last month's newsletter, but all Swale East residents are welcome to help decide where the money is spent.

December started very busy, the first week included an Informal Cabinet Meeting, a meeting of the Sittingbourne Town Centre Regeneration Steering Group, a member workshop on Swale's air quality, a full day of Home to School Transport Appeal Hearings at County Hall, a joint briefing for Swale and Canterbury County Members on school attainment and future place provision, Local Action Group Meeting to allocate Grant Funding to rural businesses and finally I chaired the Kent Environment Annual Awards held this year at Broome Park, Barham. Swale organisations as well as some Swale Borough Council Officers and Departments were prominent amongst those recognised.

Later in the month were a Full Meeting of Kent County Council, a Swale Borough Council Cabinet meeting and the AGM of Thames Gateway Kent Partnership where I was reelected as Vice Chairman. There was also another Informal meeting of Swale's Cabinet, a meeting with Officers at County Hall to discuss the provision of youth services in Swale especially the Swale East Rural area which I represent. This is a matter where the delivery of the contract gives me serious

concerns. I also attended a site meeting at South Street, Boughton to review the Boundaries of the Conservation Area together with representatives of both the Parish Council and the Neighbourhood Plan Committee.

During the month of December I attended Parish Council meetings at Selling, Graveney, Sheldwich, Newnham and Lynsted. I also facilitated a site meeting at Bapchild with representatives of the Parish Council together with the Kent County Council Footpaths Officer to discuss the duration of any temporary footpath closures associated with the Stone's Farm development.

News from GREAT



The Cleve Hill Development Consent Order (Planning Application) was accepted for examination by the National Planning Inspectorate and the deadline for registration of expressions of interest/objections was 28 January. GREAT is encouraged that the Parish Council submitted a very robust response to the Planning Inspectorate. They are also aware that a number of key organisations / groups have registered their interest. It is expected that all registrations will be available to view on the National Planning Inspectorate's website at some point in February. More details on this will be provided in our next update.

GREAT made every effort to encourage all individuals in a household to register their individual objections to the Planning Inspectorate. Concerns were raised by some parishioners that they did not have computer access to register or an email address, which was a mandatory field in GREAT helped a number of the registration process. individuals to complete their registration at the event held in the village hall on 20 January. This was primarily for people to view the full paper version of the application submitted made by the developers. The only other copy available locally was at Faversham Library, which wasn't considered to be easily accessible for many parishioners. Thanks to Graham and Maggie for, again, helping to distribute the flyers for the event. An additional copy of the documentation has also been provided to a parishioner with a disability (under the Disability Discrimination Act), which required a number of emails but was eventually agreed to.

GREAT also worked with The Faversham Society on raising awareness about the proposals and the need to register. A stall in Faversham market was manned by The Faversham Society and GREAT representatives on two Saturdays in January, where people could view a sample of the application documentation and complete their registrations.

To encourage registration by villagers and others passing through, a display of geese and sheep were strategically placed in the village. They were designed, made and positioned by Tom King from the parish and proved to be very effective at gaining people's attention. The Parish Council was impressed with this display and have asked Tom to design a few more. These will be placed in the meadow near the village sign (from Seasalter direction) to discourage people from throwing their empty alcohol bottles and cans where there are sheep grazing.

GREAT met with the RSPB to encourage a more assertive approach to their objections to the development, and are collaborating with them on a communication campaign to increase national awareness of the proposals.

Helen Whately, MP for Faversham and Mid Kent, continues to be very supportive and is organising a number of additional meetings with GREAT and other organisations, including the Environment Agency, to further strengthen our campaign. Finally, Rosie Duffield, MP for Canterbury, held a meeting on 25 January at The Seasalter Christian Centre on the proposed development. GREAT was represented there and successfully 'encouraged' her to register her objection to the scheme.
